

The Village Emergency Telephone

The Stratford St Mary Village Emergency Telephone System (VETS) is now up and running.

If you are with a person who you suspect has had a cardiac arrest, immediately call 999 as normal. An ambulance will be dispatched as soon as possible, however due to the location of Stratford St Mary, this may take a while.

You will probably be alone with the patient and cannot leave them to go and get the village defibrillator, so we have a group of 10 volunteers who will respond to a telephone call from you. All the volunteers are on the same number and if a volunteer is available you give them your location, they will collect the defibrillator and come to your location, they will then assist in CPR and using the defibrillator until the ambulance or medics arrive.

Road Closure in Dedham

Suffolk Highways plans to undertake maintenance to Dedham Mill Bridge on B1029 Dedham Road, Dedham. The work will involve the replacement of the existing bearings at the south end, resurfacing, installation of new movement joints and painting of the barriers.

The works are programmed to start on 5 October and will continue until 4 December 2020. Please note that during this time, it will be necessary for the road to be closed 24/7 to enable the works to be carried out safely. Temporary traffic signals will also be in place, as detailed below.

- 5 October to 11 October 2020 Temporary Traffic Signals
- 12 October to 29 November 2020 – 24/7 Road Closure

30 November to 4 December 2020 – Temporary Traffic Signals


The road will be closed from the junction of Church Road, Stratford, to Dedham Mill Bridge. Pedestrian & cyclist access will not be available during the road closure.

For the duration of the road closure, traffic will be diverted via

Clockwise diversion route - B1029, Birchwood Road, A12, A1232 and B1029

Anticlockwise diversion route - B1029, A12, Birchwood Road and B1029

Please note that Dedham Riverside Car Park (near Mill Pond) will be closed for the duration of the works however, alternative parking is nearby.

Hopefully you have all enjoyed the Autumn colours either in your gardens or, if on trips, out in the wider countryside and the hot dry summer I guess seems already to be fading quickly into the back of our memories. November of course is the start of the new gardening year as we prepare for the New Spring to come once again. It's time to plant new bulbs if not already done so, but especially tulip bulbs which if planted in November to December, it helps to ward off tulip fire disease that causes papery brown patches on stems and foliage and withering of the flower heads which can absolutely decimate your spring display. Of course you may have a tree or shrubs to re-locate or plant anew so now is a good time before the ground gets frozen or too wet. There seems to be a lot of the dreaded Honey fungus about this year especially on old tree or hedge stumps left in the ground. It's always best to have these removed but is quite hard work, so it's easier perhaps to just leave them in but once they start to decay honey fungus follows.

As I write these notes the Rooks, a odd Jay + several Magpies are collecting acorns off a neighbouring Oak tree and overhead 4 Buzzards are circling above and drifting south. Have you seen the winter thrushes yet? Redwing, Fieldfare & Mistle Thrush as they arrive into the UK to feed off all the wonderful berries on the surrounding hedgerows. When walking the footpath which surrounds the golf course in Raydon you may see quite large flocks in most years.

Club news of course is a bit thin as nothing can get started again yet and at this point must confirm to you members that the Social evening + AGM normally held end of November has been cancelled. What a 40th year we have endured with only the

February meeting going ahead as planned. No shows, no coach outing, no garden visits and no club meetings what a disaster !! or is it? 

To comply with current government guidelines, the bar will now open at **8pm** and close promptly at **10pm**. A good selection of beers, wines and spirits are available at considerably less than pub prices.

Membership is open to all residents of the village (over 18s only) and anyone wishing to join is welcome to come along to enjoy a socially distanced drink and chat.



As a consequence, I thought it worth sharing with you too:

Fake Penalty Charge Notice

The email claims the recipient has driven on a road that has a charging scheme and as such a penalty is payable. Note however that it does not give details of the vehicle, the location, nor the date or time of

the incident.

If you receive the same or a similar email, do not click the link. This is a phishing scam designed to steal your personal information and money.

If you receive it, forward the email to report@phishing.gov.uk

Fake Facebook pages wanting you to enter their competition for a free holiday. The pages have been set up by scammers for 'like-farming', using your interaction to harvest personal data.

Before liking a page, especially a big business like Center Parcs, check if it has a blue tick. This means the page has been verified by Facebook. You can also look at the Page transparency to see when it was created. The real Center Parcs page was created in August 2010. This fake page was created on 1st April 2020 and changed it's name on 6th September 2020.

The fake Christmas at Lapland page was created on 22nd June 2020 and has only two posts. The Page transparency shows that it is managed by two profiles, one in Brazil, the other in Tanzania.

Don't just look at the competition post. Look at the page history, and the other posts on the page. Does it look genuine?

If you come across a fake page on Facebook, report it by going to the page and tap *** from the top right and select "Give feedback or report this Page". Select "Scams and Fake Pages".

Fake promotions or competitions on Facebook typically urge users to either engage with a Facebook post (e.g. share and comment) to win a prize, or click a link to claim a prize. Or possibly both.

Our recommend is to never interact with these types of Facebook posts.

My family Village

After June & July Quartet writing down some of my childhood days I have been asked for some more about Higham so here we go again.

Higham

Unlike many other surrounding villages, as far as housing goes, Higham is one of those villages which has changed very little since I lived at Bridge House close to the River Brett from part of the 1940's, 1950's and some of 1960's.

Some of the country cottages have gone and been replaced by a few larger houses, but I guess the biggest change is in the character of the people. Many people in those days did not have their own motor cars so did not go anywhere except perhaps by bike or bus to do the weekly shopping. Perhaps some of you can remember "Norfolks" coach company which used to come through Higham from Nayland on a Tuesday and ended up in Ipswich once per week. If I remember right it used to go to Colchester as well but on alternate weeks.

Mum took us on the bus to mainly buy clothes as in those days we had a local groceries service delivered by van from Mr Tice from his shop in Stratford St Mary (opposite the water mill). Mum put her order in for the following week to Mr Tice when he arrived with our food so she always had to think ahead, not easy when in the fifties as we were still on rations till 1953. Anything forgotten you either went without or sometimes I was sent by bike to the shop in Stratford. A character who lived close by in no 2 (mid terrace) Bridge cottages was a Mr Bernard Wright always known as 'Bummy'.

He kept a gun dog in a wire kennel at the bottom of his garden (forgotten dogs name) and it's a good job I didn't believe everything he told me. Talk about long stories and one of his favourites was when we went fishing (I was 8-9yrs) he claimed one day a kingfisher sat on the end of his rod just waiting to snatch the fish on his line when reeled in. He also caught a young jackdaw and kept it as a pet which he taught to talk.

In those days life was a hard existence and he used to go out shooting rabbits etc for him and his dog to eat, also he taught me how to set a snare successfully and it's still hanging up in my shed to this day but not been used by me since 1968.

Now how would you re-act today if you saw a older man walking down to the river Brett wearing a multi coloured dressing gown and material slippers and wandering in a not so straight line !! !! I can only guess but in the years I lived in Higham it was common place to meet Mr Fred Boucher who lived at the top of the hill walking down (wet or dry days) to the common land meadows by the Brett where he kept some of his race horses.

Eccentric he was but a lovely knowledgeable person to talk to when not under the influence. Sadly he lost two out of the three race horses during a very bad thunder storm as they were spooked and drowned in the river. I remember a few days later him sitting in our kitchen at Bridge House having a drink (Gin was his tipple) with Dad talking about the storm and loss of his horses but when Dad said he was sorry for his loss his reply was well boy I will just have to buy two more. Lucky he was reasonably well off as he enjoyed many of his horses winning at Newmarket.

He wanted to take me to one of the races to see his horse running but Dad was not keen so I did not go !!! perhaps it was just as well although I was disappointed at the time (I was only 11 yrs).

Fred had a car, a dark green Vanguard saloon (he called it the tank) which was parked outside his back door on the slope of his drive. He always backed down the drive and turned out on the road (not much traffic in those days).

Now one day he was in a hurry (that was his excuse) and on reaching the road missed his brake pedal but stamped harder on his accelerator pedal which took him across the road and through the wall opposite. "Opps!" Thankfully nothing on the road but the wall was badly damaged and his car also. It was never repaired but still drivable.

Now another character was a Mr Alfred Easey who used to ride around on his tricycle. In 1953 he had the honour of planting the nowadays large copper beech tree on the village green as part of the Queen Elizabeth coronation party held (very wet day) that year.

I was only 8 years old then with blonde curly hair and the tree was only a sapling but we have both lived and grown older, me being white on top but the tree in all its glory looks a picture especially in Springtime and now with Autumn colours.

Ok that's it for now with part two in December as I will take you on a walk around Higham next month with further names and house names I still remember all those happy 52 years ago including The Bridge, The Old Post Office, The Kings Head, The Guildhall, Tunmers farm and the Old Vicarage + Barn which was used for !!!!!

It's only a month to wait.

Want to book a coronavirus test ? - please don't call 111 or your GP practice

The NHS is urging people not to call its 111 helpline or their GP practice or visit their hospital's emergency department if they want a coronavirus test.

That's the message from health professionals across Suffolk and north east Essex who have highlighted a big increase in call volumes, with some GP practices reporting that one in five telephone calls relate to coronavirus testing.

Instead, tests should be booked via the Government website - https://www.gov.uk/ get-coronavirus-test - or the NHS 119 dedicated helpline.

Kevin Whomes, practice manager at Swan and Forest GP surgeries in west Suffolk, said: "This big increase in call volume is placing an extra burden on our already very busy staff, as well as making it more difficult for patients with primary care needs to contact us.

"It's quite right that anyone with coronavirus symptoms gets tested, and it's clear people are making an effort to arrange a test. But I urge them not to contact their practice if they have an inquiry about testing or are having difficulty in organising a test, as we have no access to the test system."

Belinda White, Regional Manager at Care UK which operates the 111 service across Suffolk and north east Essex, said: "As always the 111 service is here 24/7 for all urgent medical help and advice. What we cannot do is book COVID-19 tests.

"We understand it must be so frustrating for patients who have to sit in a call waiting line to have their query answered only to be told that they have come through to the wrong service so please dial 119 for test help. "By dialing 119 for tests you are helping us to ensure we can support those with medical issues promptly at this time of increased pressure."

Anyone with coronavirus symptoms can get a test.

Coronavirus symptoms are:

•

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste



The Local Government Boundary Commission for England

We have recently published draft recommendations for new divisions, division boundaries, and division names for Suffolk County Council.

Having a flu vaccination will help protect you, your family and your NHS

Health professionals across north east Essex and Suffolk are emphasising that it has never been more crucial for people in at-risk groups to have a flu vaccination.

It is safe to attend a flu clinic to have your vaccination. This year there will be a change to the way flu vaccinations are delivered as health teams need to factor in social distancing and infection prevention measures in order to continue to keep people safe.

Some GP practices may be offering drivethrough appointments at community centres or village halls, and practices will soon be contacting those eligible by letter, telephone or text to offer specific time appointments rather than the usual drop-in sessions. Please be patient – you don't need to contact your GP practice as they'll be in touch with you.

Many local community pharmacies are also offering bookable flu vaccination appointments for those who are eligible. So please contact your pharmacy for details. Pharmacies are working with GP colleagues to ensure the best possible access to the vaccine for all eligible groups and may be able to offer evening or weekend appointments.

While a flu vaccination will not protect you against Covid-19, it will reduce some of the very serious consequences of flu, which can lead to existing health issues getting worse or the development of conditions such as pneumonia or bronchitis, middle ear infections in children or brain damage in unborn babies.

The vaccine won't stop all flu viruses but if you do get flu after vaccination it is likely to be milder and shorter-lived than it otherwise might have been. For most children the flu vaccine is a quick and easy nasal spray. Children aged 2 and 3 receive the vaccine through their GP and those at school from Reception to Year 7 will receive it in school.

By having a flu vaccination you'll not only be protecting your own health, but also helping prevent the spread of flu to others as well reducing the risk of hospital admission and protecting our precious NHS resources.

Patients in 'at risk' groups who are eligible to receive a free flu vaccination include:

everyone aged 65 years or over

women who are pregnant

those aged six months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups including patients who suffer from a chronic illness, such as Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), kidney disease, hepatitis, Parkinsons, HIV and diabetes

children aged two or three years old on 31 August 2020

all primary school-aged children

children with a health condition that puts them at a greater risk of fluthose in

long-stay residential care homes

carers

all frontline health and social care workers

This year also includes:

year 7 secondary school-aged children

household members of those who may have been shielding

later in the year the age range will extend to those aged 50-64

Dr Hasan Chowhan, a GP in Colchester and chairman of NHS North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "We've been planning hard to ensure we're able to deliver an effective flu vaccination programme this year, working with our primary care and community pharmacy colleagues.

"Things will certainly be a bit different this year, since drop-in appointments are currently not practical. So instead, over the coming weeks, practices will be busy contacting their eligible patients to book them in for appointment. I urge people not to contact their surgery to try and book an appointment. Please wait until you are contacted. Don't worry, we will be in touch."

Dr Mark Shenton, a GP in Stowmarket and chairman of NHS Ipswich and East Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "I want to reassure people that it is safe to attend a flu vaccination appointment at the GP practice or community pharmacy, and I urge people not to be deterred from protecting their health this winter.

"The momentous events of the last seven months have certainly given us all cause for anxiety and concern, but if anything, these events have given everyone in an at-risk group even greater reason to have a flu vaccination.

"The flu vaccination will help protect your health and the health of your loved ones, so please don't ignore the appointment invitation from your GP practice."

Dr Christopher Browning, a GP in Long Melford and chairman of NHS West Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "This year will see an extension of those people in the at-risk groups who are eligible for a free flu vaccination, including members of households where people were shielding and young people in Year 7 at school.

"Additionally, it has been announced nationally that people aged 50 - 64 years will be eligible to receive a vaccination later this year. It's important to remember though that people in this age category will not be

contacted until at least November and this depends on availability of the vaccine."

Junchao Jiang, Pharmacist from Parade Pharmacy in Sudbury, said: "This flu season will be our biggest challenge yet so making a booking with your local community pharmacy is essential so we can deliver your flu jab in the safest method possible. Many community pharmacies are offering evenings and weekend bookings so please speak to your local team about what they can offer you so we can keep you well."

Cllr James Reeder, Suffolk County Council Cabinet Member for Public Health and Prevention said:

"If you intend to receive your flu vaccination from your GP please wait until you are contacted by the surgery. Once you are contacted it is incredibly important that you take up your appointment. It's important not only for your health, but also for those you love as it reduces the chance of spreading the flu virus.

"Flu can be deadly, with an estimated 10,000 people dying each year in England and Wales. The flu vaccine is our best protection against it. Although things will be different this year, please be assured that measures have been put in place to make sure it is safe for you and those you love to have your flu vaccination."
