Dear friends,

Alleluia. Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

This response is traditionally part of our Easter services. Last year our church buildings were closed due to lockdown, and somehow it felt as if Easter didn't happen. No Good Friday Walk of Witness, no Holy Saturday, no Dawn services, no lighting of the new Paschal candle and no Easter hymns.

I wonder what your favourite ones are, 'Jesus Christ is risen today' or 'Thine be the glory' or 'Ye choirs of new Jerusalem' perhaps? We are still not allowed to sing in church, but we are confident that we will be gathering for services during Holy Week (the week leading up to Easter), and we will be having Easter services in all four churches on Easter Day. It will be very special to celebrate my first Easter with you!

Easter is the most important festival in the Christian calendar because we celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead. On Good Friday we remembered that Jesus was crucified. When his body had been taken down from the cross, he was buried in a cave that was cut out of a rock. The tomb was guarded by soldiers and a big stone was rolled in front of the entrance so that no one could steal Jesus' body. After three days, on what we now celebrate as Easter Sunday, some women visited the grave and found that the stone had been moved and that the tomb was empty. On

that day, Jesus appeared to Mary and to some of his friends, and for forty days afterwards he was seen by many other people. From now on his followers believed that God had raised Jesus from the dead and that everything he had told them was true.

Easter has always been a time of celebration and feasting and many different customs are associated with Easter, although not all of them are based on Christian traditions. Some of them, like the Easter Bunny, are of pagan origin. Other popular traditions include Easter Egg hunts, egg rolling competitions, colouring and decorating eggs. making Easter bonnets and having special Easter food. One of my childhood memories is of a Dutch Easter loaf, a lovely sultana bread with a dusting of icing sugar on the top. Sadly, today Easter, like Christmas, has become very commercialised and for many people it is more about greeting cards, presents and chocolates. For the early Christians, Jesus resurrection changed everything. Their faith was renewed for now they had proof of the Good News of Jesus Christ. And so it is for us. too. At Easter, after the austerity of Lent, we decorate our churches and we have Easter lilies, a symbol of the resurrection, in memories of loved on who have died. We can now live in hope, for we all have the hope of eternal life. And to celebrate this joyful festival, you may even have a chocolate Easter egg, or two...I wish you all a very Happy Easter.


It would be great if we can consider holding a summer flower show in August once again which will give the committee plenty to think about trying to accommodate and modify the show to suit our new slightly smaller venue.

Raydon Quiet Lanes Initiative

Thank you to everyone who responded to the public consultation Raydon Parish Council conducted on 8 March with regard to the Quiet Lanes initiative in Lower Raydon. To clarify a few points raised:

- · Suffolk County Council is subsidising this scheme following a successful pilot project in East Suffolk. They have recently announced an increase in their subsidy which means, following encouraging comments from the public forum, we will apply to include Wades Lane and Noakes Road in the scheme.
- · The aim of the scheme is to raise awareness of other road users. It is not intended to draw further motorists to the area and therefore we do not foresee an increase in parking issues related to this initiative.
- · Our current plans use existing signposts only, no additional signposts will be needed
- · Further information about this initiative can be found at www.quietlanessuffolk.co.uk.

Given the majority of positive responses, Raydon Parish Council agreed at its March meeting to proceed with the scheme.

Meetings are usually held in the Village Hall, although because of current restrictions these are being held via Zoom, all villagers, old and new, are welcome to attend the meetings as observers, and there is always an open forum at the beginning of each meeting if you wish to comment.

Additional meetings may be called if a planning application needs to be discussed inbetween Parish Council meetings, all villagers are welcome to attend these meetings also.

Notices and agendas of upcoming meetings are displayed in the phone box at Church Square and on the notice board at Bacons Green at least 3 clear working days before the meeting, notice is also given on the Holton St Mary website and on the Holton St Mary facebook page.

Annual Parish Meeting

An Annual Parish Meeting is held in April, the activities of the Parish Council. Village Committees and groups from the past vear are reviewed - this is a chance for electors to come together and discuss parish matters. The Whites and Yellows associated with Spring

The year starts with snowdrops emerging around the 2nd week in January. There are many varieties and they are best seen in clusters or en masse in carpets and found under trees, bushes and in partial shade They are favourites in many gardens but for show, they are best seen in church graveyards such as at Groton and Wiston (near Nayland), the banks of the River Stour at Clare and for public display, Christ Church Park, Ipswich comes to mind. By the time the meteorological spring starts on March 1st, they are mostly finished. Orange flowering aconites can sometimes be seen in shaded areas in clusters by themselves or with snowdrops in late January and February

Spring wouldn't be same without daffodils, there are more than a hundred varieties and take pride of place in Spring shows. Not this year though, due to the Coronavirus Lockdown. They are cut for sending to markets such as Covent Garden from the Scilly Isles and West Cornwall in early January providing a living for people in that area. The Trumpet varieties appear first with the poeticus and other varieties later and flowers can be seen well into April. Of all the wild flowers. spring wouldn't be the same without Primroses. On country walks, vellow primroses can be seen at the side of hedges and at the edge of ditches having a preference for half shaded damp conditions. There are also related varieties such as Cowslips.

Dandelions and daises, although classified as weeds, are spring flowers and young children do make daisy chains, perhaps out of fashion now. The small white anemones can be seen in April in some woods. Stour Woods at Ramsey comes to mind. The white flowers are infertile so the plants increase by root growth. They are a protected species and should never be uprooted. Of cultivated flowers, spring wouldn't be the same without Forsythia, Mahonia and white cherry blossoms. One

shouldn't forget the yellow flowering Jasmin , which is at its best in November/ December but continues to flower into January and February. The list is endless

The yellow Brimstone butterfly can be seen during March and early April. The male is deeper vellow than the female This butterfly is swift in flight but can settle on aubretia with its wings usually closed The eggs are laid on buckthorn particularly seen on calcareous soil on the South Downs, This butterfly often has a second brood in August. Some specimens have been known to live for 1 1/2 years, hibernating in the winter. The orange tip butterfly is about for 4 weeks at the end of April and start of May. It is only the male that has the orange tip and the female can be mistaken for a small white butterfly The large cabbage white and small white butterflies start to appear in April augmented by influxes from the continent and are about until October, not the favourite insect for gardeners Spring wouldn't be the same without lambs, the lambing season being in full swing from February onwards. Unlike cattle and pigs. lambs have a distinct season for giving birth. White or whitish yellow seems to be the predominate colour, but not always There is a saying that any old hen lays an egg in March and April. More so with farmyard and free range poultry. Eggs with often yellow chicks emerging are signs of new life and it is understandable that egg hunts are popular with children even though the eggs are hidden first by adults for the eggs to be found! Of course, confectioners profit from the sale of chocolate eggs which most children delight in having at Easter So Easter cards with lambs. hens and chicks. maybe with daffodils with a Church in the background, portraying new life seems to me what Easter is about with White and Yellow dominating in colour



Constable Country Medical Practice – Practice Update

Coronavirus Vaccination Programme

As of 8th March, the practice has administered over 5000 doses of the Covid-19 vaccine. We have now vaccinated in excess of 96% of all patients over the age of 70. We continue to vaccinate patients against Covid as fast as we take delivery of the vaccines. Unfortunately, we still have little forward visibility of when and how many vaccines will be delivered.

Please be assured that as soon as we have confirmed delivery dates we are setting up clinics and inviting patients in. Our preferred method of booking for all under 80 year olds is via a text message which contains a link to follow enabling patients to select an appointment date and time.

Patients who don't have a mobile number recorded with the practice, and those patients who don't book via the text message link, will be contacted by the practice to book an appointment.

Patients have also been contacted to book vaccinations at mass vaccination clinics. The practice will be informed when the vaccination has taken place and removed from our list of outstanding patients.

Second doses will be administered approximately 11 weeks after the first dose. However, although some patients were booked an appointment for a second dose, we cannot confirm the date and time until we have received confirmation of the vaccine delivery date. We may not receive this until 10 days before the vaccines are delivered. We will therefore contact patients the week before their second dose is due to either confirm their existing appointment, rearrange it, or book a new appointment. The practice has detailed

records of when second doses are due so there is no need to contact the practice. Please wait for us to contact you.

Please note that current guidance is that the type of vaccine administered for the second dose should be the same as the first dose, i.e. Pfizer or Astra Zeneca. Also note that we will administer second doses to those patients who have been vaccinated at the practice. If you have been vaccinated elsewhere, they will arrange your second dose.


Thank you again for your support and consideration whilst we continue with the vaccination programme.

Circular Walk 4: St Mary's (Holton St Mary) to St Mary's (Raydon) (6.5km)

- 1. Start in Church Square. Go through the black wrought-iron gate on the gravel path, pass the Church entrance (South porch) and bear right at the War Memorial on to a grassy path to the kissing gate that opens on to the field. Bear half left diagonally across the field. At the tree-plantation around 'Holton Hall', bear half right to enter a narrow tree-lined path with a fence and then brick wall on your right towards Holton Hall Farm (APT Farming)
- 2. After 80 metres you emerge into the farmyard. With eyes and ears open for farm vehicles (no fantastic or dangerous creatures here) continue ahead into a grassy field and alongside a line of young hedges that 'shield' a phalanx of 10 rather sad static caravans. Go through a cute arch in the hedge and cross the next field (+/- a crop). Pass through another arch and then slightly left across a grass field towards a stile (with Footpath sign) in the

corner of the field

- 3. Cross said stile and turn left on to Sandpits Lane. Walk down this lane for approximately 120 metres passing 'Lark Hall' and 'Laits Barn' on the left.
- On the apex of a blind bend to the left, turn right at the Bridleway sign. Walk straight and slightly downhill on a wide and sandy and then grass track. As the path gently ascends look out for a brokenshafted yellow-arrowed footpath post (this supine post has been up and down more times than Norwich City FC). The path continues straight ahead, bisecting a field (muddy after rain). When you reach the hedging it joins three other paths. Keep straight on a narrow (1.5 metre) path between hedges, soon emerging on to a field (usually with a crop). Keep straight on the grassy verge with the field on the left and Brett Vale golf course on the right; errant golf balls are a hazard to feet but occasionally the head After 90 metres at a grey and rust-red corrugated barn on your left, continue straight on to a wide grassy track. Pass through (if open) or

shimmy next to a wide gate

- 5. Where the track meets the road (Sulley's Hill), cross over and just to the left of a white sign, 'Sulleys' Manor Deliveries Sully's Lakes', slip through a dinky gap in the hedge and walk down a short but pretty and sunlit-dappled woodland path. This avoids the potentially life-shortening road just a few metres to your right. After 150 metres it opens on to the golf course.
- Turn left and walk along a track passing a reed pond on your left and then bear right and slightly upwards to pass a greenish maintenance shed, the outside festooned with mowers, etc. Keep to the right of this shed and walk straight ahead to a relatively wide grass path between hedging / trees. As it ascends, almost hilllike in inclination, it is somewhat sandy. Ignore the first stile on the left after 130 metres. The path bends sharp right and then less sharply left. Approximately 250 metres after the first stile and just as the path bears right, cross a high-rise stile skulking in the left-hand hedge. Turn right to walk alongside trees (on your right) and fields dotted with a few trees and sometimes a horse or two that slope steeply down on your left. Nice view... After 150 metres at the corner of this field, turn left at a yellow-arrowed way post. Within 10 metres vou arrive at an electric fence. Use the red plastic insulating handle to unhook it (not a shocking experience) and re-hook after safe transit. If slim, supple and silly, you may limbo under it, but be it on your own head... Descend a very steep but short grassy bank. At the bottom, the large steel gate is locked but 12 metres to its right is a new and very small steel gate. Pass through and after a few metres, cross a stile into a field et equorum. Bear right and. hugging the field edge with high hedging on your right, walk up the undulation to go through two steel and then a wooden gate, passing some equine equipment (a circular 'walking cage' and behind, a dressage area). Twenty metres after the wooden gate, at the field-corner, turn right through a large steel gate with a yellow arrow-marked sign. After 20 metres on an overgrown
- grass path, turn left to go through a rustic wooden gate to enter the grounds of St Mary's Church (Raydon). Keep straight to meet and then walk down a hoggin path past the Church porch, go through a gate and arrive at the road (B1070)
- 7. Turn right and walk, initially on the pavement on the right and then as it stops (almost opposite Rectory Close), cross and use the pavement on the left. Pass a new estate on the left (King George's View [did he ever came here or Dunningham Drive). Ahead and on the apex of a blind bend, you will see a small, drab, green building, 'Country Covers'
- 8. Cross with ears and eyes agog and seek the secure refuge of a sign-posted footpath which leads between 'Country Covers' on your left and hedging/ trees on your right. After 40 metres this opens on to fields. Continue for 500 metres on a wide grass verge with a field to your left. As it bends gently to the left with views of Bacon's Green, you are met and kindly escorted by five towering telegraph poles (life-savers in autumn fog / winter snowdrifts). Continue to a subtly staggered 'four-way' footpath, just before the 5th telegraph pole
- 9. Turn right here down the grassy verge with the field to your right. Pass between a house fence/hedge on the left and brick building (sewage main) on the right. On emerging, hold your breath (the smell) and turn sharp left to walk up the road through Bacon's Green
- 10. Bear right at the village green and then right again on to Sandpits Lane. Continue for approximately 260 metres passing, in sequence, Anglia Grain Services on the right and then Holton Place and Holton Lodge on the left. Keep your eyelids open for the stile and barely-visible Footpath sign on the left (point 3). Knees up ... and retrace your steps back to Church Square. Bravo!

SESAW News

Hopefully it's dry and sunny as you read this, at the time of writing the rain is lashing and the wind is howling but Easter approaches. As our thoughts turn to chocolate, spring flowers, cute lambs and baby rabbits, SESAW volunteer, Karen, who specialises in looking after our rabbits offers some seasonal advice.

"Watching rabbits running, jumping, playing and grooming each other is a lovely sight but Easter is not the time to get them as pets for your children. Sadly rabbits are the most neglected pet because people assume they are easy to look after and don't live very long. They need a spacious exercise area attached to a roomy hutch which should be seen as a place to rest in, NOT A PRISON. Rabbits should be neutered and live in pairs or groups; a single outdoor rabbit living alone would have an extremely miserable life.

Unlike Bugs Bunny, rabbits do not just eat carrots! The diet should consist of 80% good quality hay, small amounts of commercial feed and leafy greens. They DO NOT like being picked up and carried around so children should play with them at ground level. Rabbits can live up to 10 years and require yearly vaccinations, regular worming and health checks. If you understand that having a rabbit is NOT an easy or short term commitment, then please offer a home to a rescue rabbit after Easter."

That just leaves me enough space for our contact details for Karen when you have finished your chocolate eggs - but make sure to keep them away from all the dogs including me, Kenny (the Boss) Chihuahua.






