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Dear friends,

As I write this, we are in the middle of a cold spell with bitterly cold days and even colder nights. The forecast for tonight is that the temperature will drop to a feel of -9. Over the weekend this will be followed by gale force winds as we await storm Isha, the ninth storm of the season. before it is said to get warmer into next week.

But currently my study is freezing cold as I believe that it was converted from part of a former double garage and doesn't seem to have any form of insulation. It would be lovely to have an open fire or, even better, a wood burner but these things are not deemed necessities in clergy properties.

I shouldn't grumble though because there are so many people who are much worse off, thinking especially of those who are homeless or unemployed, and of all the families who are struggling to pay for the bare necessities in the currently economic climate where prices and rates of inflation have risen sharply. Perhaps a good reminder that we are about to enter Lent, a season of repentance and giving up some of life's luxuries.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday which is traditionally preceded by Shrove Tuesday, also known as Pancake Day. Lent comprises the 40 days leading up to Easter (not including Sundays) and it was traditionally a time of fasting. On Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call people to confession. This became known as ringing the "Pancake Bell" and this tradition survives in a number of churches where it is still rung today.

Lent is also a time of prayer. This year, our hearts go out to the many people who are suffering because of wars and hostilities in their home countries, especially to the ongoing situations in Eastern Europe and in the Middle East. Please pray for lasting peace in these suffering places.

Lent is also a good time to review our charitable giving. If you are able to give financially, there is the Bishops' annual Kagera Lent Appeal, but please don't forget other worthwhile charities – Médecins Sans Frontières / Doctors Without Borders (MSF) who have been caring for the sick and the injured in war zones around the world for over 50 years. Or perhaps you prefer to support charities closer to home, for example the Ipswich Foodbank 'Families in Need (FIND) or 'Crisis', the UK national charity for people experiencing homelessness. I commend all of these to your prayers.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on 14th February which is also Valentine's Day. We will be gathering for a traditional Ash Wednesday service at 10am in Higham that day. Why not come and join in? Wishing you every blessing for Lent.

Exciting News - The Institute Hall Refurbishment

The Institute Hall Committee were successful in their application for a Capital Grant from Babergh District Council, and are pleased to report that work has now started and is due to be completed at the beginning of February.

The work being undertaken is:

• a new ceiling with updated lighting (with some coloured dimmable lights – (great for party and event moods)

• updated heaters

• the walls are being lined with insulating board to conserve energy

Other recent improvements include a new cooker, fridge and the installation of free high speed broadband. All in all this should make a more modern and appealing community venue.

Whilst the Grant received has gone some way towards the costs of refurbishment, the committee has had to put its own funds towards the work. This does not however include decoration. Therefore to keep costs down we are asking for volunteers to help with the final decorating and hope that this can be seen as a 'bringing the community together' exercise. The work will involve painting walls and ceiling with emulsion, refreshing the paint on skirting boards, doors and door surrounds.

If you can help in any way please let me know, then I will be in touch once I know when the work will be complete. The more help the less onerous the task.

I look forward to hearing from you and welcoming you to our refurbished Institute Hall.

Please find below some information from the Stratford St Mary Parish Council meeting held on the 8th of January:

• The PC have signed up for Suffolk County Councils Self Help Scheme. This scheme is not just for Councillors – people in the parish can also get involved, please contact the Clerk for more details.

• Dog bins on the Village Green and Upper Street/School Lane will be replaced.

• Expenditure was agreed for the purchase of 3 'No dog fouling' signs for Strickmere.

The precept for 2024/2025 was agreed to be kept at \pounds 16,100 which is the same as last year. With the change of Babergh Councils Tax base this will mean an increase of 0.27% for Band D Council tax which equates to a 13p increase for the year.

• Expenditure was approved for the purchase of 2 new notice boards at The Anchor and the Weir.

 \cdot The purchase of a new speed indicative sign from Elan City was approved.

• The PC agreed to arrange for Councillors to do formal walks around the village once a month to look at maintenance and any issues that they may be.

 \cdot There is a fallen tree at the River Garden which the PC are looking into getting removed.

The Parish Council's next meeting will be held on Monday 11th March 2024 at the Village Institute, Higham Road at 19:30.

Raydon Parish Council Update - Jan 24

At our first meeting of 2024 we had some lively discussion on the key issues affecting our residents.

On the list were:-

Highways - we are placing an order for a speed indicator to fit on the new posts on the Street.

ANPR will be placed in the village in March as part of the rota around Suffolk.

Grit bins volunteers - Grit bins are located in Lower Raydon for public use at their own risk. Note we can maintain a list of volunteers to use them who will then be covered on the SCC insurance policy. Email <u>clerk@raydonparishcouncil.gov.uk</u> If there is interest to volunteer for Woodlands Road we can consider providing bins. Let us know. In Raydon only the B1070 is gritted by Suffolk CC.

Budget 24 - We voted to maintain the precept with a 3% rise this year.

Community facilities, - The KGF pavilion continues to be the focal point for community activity alongside the Church and the Golf Club. The Parish Council is committed to see all grow and thrive and we will support them wherever possible and appropriate. In particular moving forward plans to replace the pavilion will feature this year.

Town and Country Planning - We have two major infrastructure projects affecting our area plus controversy over plans at the Golf Club and the airfield. We continue to be a central forum where all strong views can be aired in public and can influence decision makers on these and other developments in the village.

Website - Our website provider is unable to continue service to many Parish Councils so we will be setting up a new provider urgently.

NEWS FROM KING GEORGE'S FIELD TRUSTEES

The second half of 2023 was a busy period for the KGF Trustees with three major events staged at the pavilion and playing field. The Farmer's Market in July was blessed with dry weather and drew a good crowd. This was followed by a new event when Oktoberfest arrived in Raydon. German beer and sausages plus an Oompah Band and a smattering of traditional German costumes made for a lively evening and a very successful event. In response to huge demand, we are hoping that we can repeat this event in 2024. We rounded the year off with Bonfire Night, which has been a traditional Ravdon event for many years. The weather on the night was dry which encouraged a large crowd to brave the cold. The bar and the BBQ proved popular with both the mulled wine and the BBQ selling out! The firework display once again received a huge number of positive comments.

Staging these events takes a lot of time and effort from the Trustees but also from a willing group of volunteers who assist with erecting marquees, building bonfires etc. We are very grateful for this assistance and would like to say a big thank you to all those that have turned up and helped at each of the events during 2023.

Not only are these events great social occasions, bringing the village together, they are a very important source of much needed funds whilst we seek to maintain the existing pavilion and develop plans for a replacement. The Trustees are also grateful for the support received from the village and further afield in attending each event.

As well as staging these events, we also ran a village consultation meeting to reveal our initial concept plans for a new community building. This was well attended and provided some useful feedback to help us refine our plans. Following on from this we are now inviting everyone in the village and the surrounding area to respond to a consultation questionnaire. For those outside Raydon a paper copy can be emailed to vou if you contact kgf.raydon@outlook.com . We would like to encourage as many people as possible to provide feedback. Plans for the new building remain on display at the pavilion or can be found on the KGF Facebook (www.facebook.com/ page kinggeorgeraydon) or again can be emailed if requested via kgf.raydon@outlook.com . The closing date for this consultation is 29th February 2024.

Whilst all this has been going on it has still been important to keep on top of maintaining the field and the pavilion and we would also like to thank the dedicated volunteers who have spent much of the year tidying the perimeter of the playing field. The Trustees would like to wish you all the best for the New Year and look forward to your continuing support with our fundraising efforts in 2024

Coming soon a Little Free Library for Holton St Mary

Little Free Library started in St Paul Minnesota and is a nonprofit organisation. Their vision is to have a Little Free Library in every community and a book for every reader.

While the mobile Library bus visits Holton St Mary once a month, this is on a school day most months. Our Little Free Library will be for the children aged 0 – 11 years in our village. It is a book sharing concept, so you borrow a book and leave a book. It will open seven days a week and 24 hours a day and will be located on the Millenium Green near the Willow tunnel. A resident from the village has volunteered for the role of steward to ensure the Little Free Library is kept clean and inviting.

The below design has been chosen and an application has been made to the Parish Council to fund the £420 cost of making and installing the Little Free Library box. A Parish Council meeting for Holton St Mary was held on the 10th

of January 2024, Please find below some points that were discussed at this meeting:

• David Johnson was co opted onto the Parish Council - there is still 1 vacancy for a Councillor so if anyone is interested then please contact the clerk – hsmparishclerk@gmail.com

• Henry Sugden gave a presentation on his companies proposals to turn a building on Holton Hall Farm into a winery.

• The precept for 2024/2025 will be kept at £7,154 which is the same as last year. Due to a change in Babergh Council's tax base this will mean a 0.91% increase for Band D Council tax which equates to an increase of 59p for the year. Any additional money needed for the budget will be taken out of the PCs reserves.

• In commemoration of the King's Coronation it has been agreed that a Rowan tree will be planted on the Millennium Green.


• Hedgehog awareness signs – the PC would like to ask if anyone has any evidence of hedgehogs in their garden or around the village to contact the clerk.

Litter-picking audit: 1 January to 31 December 2023

This is the litter-picking team's audit of 2023. We hope it makes interesting, if not somewhat alarming reading. The team used volume rather than weight to record the amount collected. This was because it was easier to use empty bags with known volumes (e.g. compost, bark, Scrulch etc.) rather than weigh the bags. Please note that the results represent only 80-90% of the real total as not every litter-pick was recorded. The picture below is a reminder of the litter-picking circuit. This may seem extensive and in parts irrelevant to our own village but as explained in earlier articles in the Quartet, we believe that the approaches are as important as the village itself. Importantly, litter-picking on Sandpits Lane, the B1068 (Higham road) towards the A12 and the insane 90° bend on the 60mph stretch of the B1070 half-way between Holton and Raydon revealed six fly-tipped loads during 2023. All were reported to, and promptly removed by Babergh DC. Clearing the 600 yard-stretch of the A12 (between the B1068 [Higham road] and Four Sisters) was an added delight.



The total volume of 'litter' collected was **3220 litres.** This excluded our joint litterpick with Raydon on 26th March which covered the entire length of Acacia Road to Great Wenham. January **(470 litres)** and October **(140 litres)** yielded the most and least collected respectively. The B1068 (Higham Road) yielded the least litter, other than three fly-tipped loads (on the two 'laybys' just beyond Stratford Hills stables).

The following summarises a detailed analysis of what was collected. It again represents only 80-90% of the actual breakdown because not every recorded and measured litter pick was analysed, item by item...

• Glass bottles: 163

• Plastic bottles: **502** (**9** with urine, **7** on the lpswich-bound slip-road)

Cans: 870

Fast-food packaging (McD; KFC;

BK; Costa): 269

• Other food packaging (sandwiches; crisps; plastic cold meat containers etc.): **370**

• Cigarette, vape and sweet wrappers + boxes: far too many to count

Of the other collected items, those that reached at least 12 (i.e. one a month) were:

• Gloves (disposable and gardening/heavy duty)

- Cyclists' 'Energy Gels'
- Soiled nappies
- Plastic sheeting (soft and hard)

Medication blister-packs/other toiletries:

The most commonly collected cans were; **Red Bull, Stella** and **Foster's** (the latter two are lagers for those who are tee-total). The most common glass bottles in descending order of frequency were those containing; **vodka** (Smirnoff, 35cL); **cider; wine** (75cL) and lager.

The most common non-litter items were car parts, the vast majority of which were wing-mirrors. Amazingly, some were intact but most were smashed. Thirty-five (35) were retrieved and usually from the narrow, Ipswich-bound slip-road heading up to the A12. This reflects (pun absolutely intended) the insanely narrow carriageways and the size and volume of HGVs and the few buses that use it. Suffolk Highways have been informed but because there have been no serious injuries or fatalities Highways have said that the road will be not widened and the speed limit will not be reduced from 60 to 40 mph ... and certainly not 30mph.

The most disgusting items were two, partly decomposed bodies of cats in a black bag and also what seemed to be a colonic irrigation pump...(not in the same bag).

The oldest item (with a best-before-date of 11.09.2008) was a packet of Midget Gems; the packet was empty so no food-poisoning risk. A prize was awarded to the collector of this item...

In 2024, we intend only to audit the number of glass bottles as these are potentially dangerous to all road-users and wildlife. It seems that drivers ... and cyclists ... adopt the policy of, 'If in doubt, chuck it out'

ESSEX SUFFOLK NORFOLK PYLONS UPDATE

New year, new phase in the offshore grid campaign.

Our campaign petition call is: 'say no to pylons and say yes to an offshore grid'. And you may have seen or heard us say that an offshore grid is better, faster and cheaper. Why is that?

Put very simply, by integrating the grid infrastructure offshore and pooling the electricity, you reduce the overall infrastructure required by 50%. That makes far more sense than the dreadful 'piecemeal' approach employed by National Grid, in which each wind farm and interconnector is offered a separate onshore connection (miles inland).

An offshore grid would be faster to implement because there would be fewer planning applications and fewer angry locals to contend with. This is what we are arguing for - keep the power offshore for as long as possible, pool it and bring it onshore at fewer, consolidated brownfield sites:



At long last, the ESO review!

National Grid Electricity Systems Operator (ESO) is at long last carrying out its review. Several of us from the Essex Suffolk Norfolk Pylons campaign group have attended their round tables. ESO is fully independent from NG Electricity Transmission (the one wanting to build pylons).

The formal remit of ESO's review is much too narrow. It is only looking at scenarios involving Norwich to Tilbury Pylons, Sea Link, North Falls and Five Estuaries.

The reason for this is that Government's Offshore Coordination Support announcement only included the latter three.

It is far from ideal because the offshore benefits we cite above come from maximum integration, not from cherry picking. Yes, we want Five Estuaries and North Falls connecting offshore but as part of the big picture.

One key omission in the very limited OCSS area is Tarchon, an interconnector offered a connection at Ardleigh. For as long as Tarchon connects there, the pylons project remains alive and kicking. Our argument for some time has been that Tarchon should connect further south at a brownfield landing point and that Five Estuaries and North Falls should connect into Tarchon.

Aside from Tarchon, the OCSS and ESO review ignore the other twelve or so wind farms and interconnectors in planning in the North Sea. These need to be integrated.

Informally, we have been told by ESO that they are in fact also analysing our offshore grid proposal. That sounds like great news and we are seeking more information.

Final pylons consultation

In the meantime, we know that NG ET will launch its final pylons consultation as soon as it can after the ESO review. That ends 9 March. So, we are busy getting prepared for that... Keeping mentally and physically well during the cold winter weather

With a Met Office yellow cold weather alert in operation in January, the medical director for the NHS in Suffolk and north east Essex is urging people to check in with elderly and vulnerable relatives, friends and neighbours to make sure their heating is working and turned on, and they are aware of the dangers of the cold.

A yellow alert indicates that there is potential for an adverse effect on people's health due to the weather conditions.


Dr Andrew Kelso, said: "Although it's no surprise for there to be cold weather at this time of year, we need to remember that cold weather can cause serious illness such as strokes, heart attacks and pneumonia, and can even kill, especially for those who have a long-term health condition or are aged over 65.

"Please take a few minutes to call round or make a 'phone call to those you know are vulnerable, just to check they are doing OK. I would encourage everyone to do their bit this winter in looking out for others in the community.

"My advice is that when indoors, have plenty of warm food and drinks to stay warm and try to maintain indoor temperatures to at least 18°C, particularly for those who have to sit still for long periods, have long term illness or are 65 or over. "It is also a good idea to have a few days' supply of food and to keep a supply of the medicine cabinet essentials to best deal with minor illness and injury.

"I would urge too, for everyone eligible to get their flu and COVID vaccinations. Ask those older and vulnerable relatives and neighbours if they have had theirs, and if not, encourage them to take up the offer to best protect their health. It's certainly not too late.

"Finally, but equally important, making contact with someone who is vulnerable needn't be just about checking they are warm and safe. Having a chat is so important for boosting a person's mental wellbeing. The winter months can increase people's sense of loneliness and isolation, and a chat could be just the boost they need."
